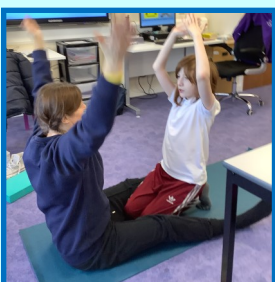
Tudors

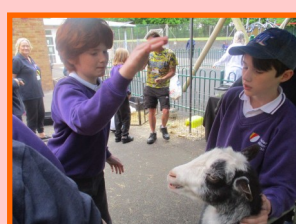
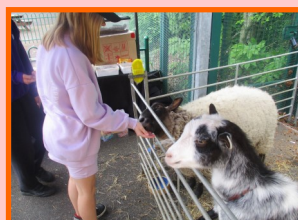
Yoga with Jenny

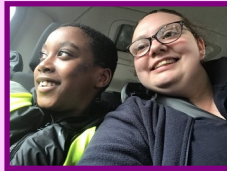
Rufus Class

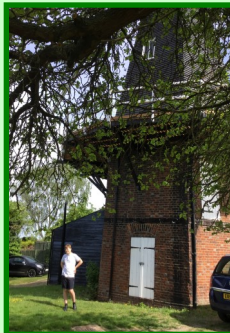
Wildwood Conservation Trust

Kent Life



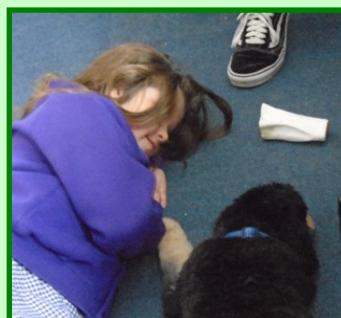
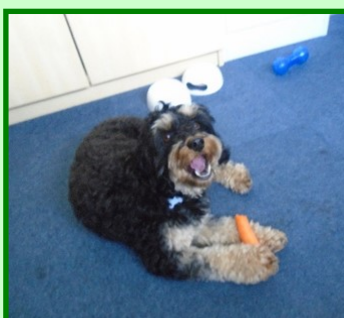

Warwick Class

Linked to their topic of The Tudors, they also visited Hever Castle and had a fantastic time exploring the castle, the mazes and the playgrounds! It just so happened that this visit took place on the anniversary of Anne Boleyn's death so the students had a very rare opportunity to see the Prayer Book that she took to her execution, exactly 486 years ago! There has been a lot of investigations going on in Science around light, shadows and the size of shadows. The English theme this term, poetry, has resulted in the amazing poems being writing by the students.

Cobham Mausoleum

As well as visiting Hever Castle this term, Leeds class were also fortunate enough to visit another historical site which is situated right on our doorstep. Cobham Mausoleum is situated within Cobham woods which is directly next to Ranscombe Country Park. Both of these are lovely walks through ancient woodland which is also home to wild cattle. The students really enjoyed the afternoon trip and expanded their knowledge on historic buildings.



Paper Art



Over the duration of the last couple of terms Group 4 has been working on animal collages using many bits of coloured paper to create an overall picture. Alex chose to do his collage based on a photo of a cat. He used lots of small bits of coloured paper to do this ensuring to colour match as closely as possible. Kevin chose to do his collage of a bear using various different shades of brown to show depth and shading. As well as these fabulous pieces of artwork, Alex also completed a paper weaving project this term, which has helped with his motor skills. He had to carefully measure and cut out the strips of paper to do this and then feed these through each other using an 'up and over, under and over' technique. Fabulous work boys!

OT Top Tip: Kitchen scraps to healthy snacks!



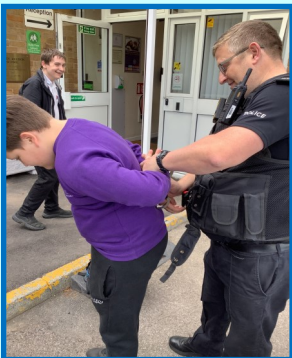
Gardening has so many therapeutic benefits, from developing fine motor skills to practicing mindfulness and improving physical fitness.
